On the first night there were about 90 people at a cultural center and then on Sunday there were about 55 first time visitors at the church.

While we were busy packing up the entire apartment and getting ready to fly back for furlough, God made it possible for the university to make a special exception allowing me to continue my studies while in the States. This lets us to keep our residency status and saves months of bureaucratic endeavors when we return. Pray for me as I study while on furlough. All of my final exams will have to be taken within 5 days of our last meeting in the States.

God also did something else unexpected. I had promised to mail a Bible to one of the taxi drivers I talked with, but did not know that such required his last name when I went to send it. Guess who was our taxi driver home the night before flying out.

We praise the Lord for a great trip back from the mission field and for the wonderful reception that many in our sending church planned for us! Meeting our pastor and some dear friends at the airport, sharing a surprise dinner with church family, finding a pantry filled with food, and having gifts waiting for the kids are some blessings we have received thus far. All this was mostly unexpected.

All the way to Pittsburgh I had to consciously not speak in Russian when talking to strangers. Our children thought it so odd to hear so much English when we arrived in Boston. All things considered, we are doing well, have much to be thankful for, and look forward to seeing as many of our supporters as possible!
